
All that jazz, Chicago style! IFRM Centennial Committee June 18-23, 2005

The International Fellowship of Rotarian Musicians was very active in performing a wide range of services at the 95th Annual Convention of Rotary International on May 23 through the 26th in Osaka, Japan.

On May 23, the Rotary World Choir, recruited by IFRM, was a major participant in the Interfaith Worship Service by performing six songs, then joined by the audience in yet another. They performed "Praise, Praise, Praise the Lord," "Praise to God," "We Are Marching in the Light of God," "Celebrate Rotary," "Dona Nobis Pacem," "This is My Song," and "Let There Be Peace on Earth." The Chairperson of IFRM, **Chungsam Doh** (Rotary Club of Morro Bay, California, USA), directed the choir, accompanied by **Mark King** (RC of Carpintaria, CA, USA). Notably, this was the premier performance for "Celebrate Rotary," a rousing song ¹ written by Chungsam Doh with words by **George Remlap** (PDG, District 5140, CA, USA).

As is the tradition of IFRM at every International Conference, the fellowship provided a lively booth for all things musical! That is, songs sheets and piano accompaniment encouraged robust community singing, including well-known PRIP dignitaries Clifford Dochterman and Rick King with their wives. Chungsam Doh and Mark King were in fine form as the resident pianists, while "Yours Truly" directed.

It was inspiring to see a number of other "guest" pianists take a spin on the ol' "Steinway" (okayreally a perfectly fine electric piano). Impressively, Mark King actually played almost every song in the Rotary Songbook! He's a trooper!

Other booth activities included selling our songbooks, our beautiful- and very recognizable-Treble Clef-Rotary Wheel pins and acquiring new members for IFRM. Customers had various reasons for joining the group and/or purchasing items: some to themselves, some for gifts, and notably, incoming Club Presidents for members of their clubs! One man took home seven pins. When asked "For whom?" he answered:" One mother, one wife and five daughters." Now, there's a musical family! The quest for new members was greatly enhanced by our new informational brochure/application provided by IFRM Treasurer, Curtis Reinhardt (RC of Arroyo Grande, CA USA), and a future Rotarian, his son, Brad Baker. Thank you, Curtis! We also have to thank the assistants who more than ably took care of our booth: Sunae Doh and Helen **Fleming**, wives respectively, of Chungsam and Bill. Unfortunately, traffic by the booth was much slower than anticipated or desired because of the adverse layout of the hotel and adjacent convention center. There were two wings of the hotel, linked only by the lower floors and only one narrow first-floor passage to the multi-storied convention center. The House of Friendship and various offices and booths were scattered among small-to-medium-sized rooms. One has to work with some determination to find a particular spot, in contrast to other convention sites where all were located close together.

In addition to the generous time they spent on "booth duties," Mark and Chungsam, our two hardworking pianists, also played background music for Special RI Ticketed events. Mark played for the President's Recognition Luncheon and the President-elect Leadership Luncheon while Chungsam serenaded the Past RI Officers Reunion Luncheon.

You can appreciate our IFRM "Renaissance Man," doing much of the work, including significant preparation. Chungsam has been responsible not only for activities already mentioned, such as directing and providing accompaniment, but also transporting half-way across the world pins, brochures, songbooks, equipment, banners and decorations!

The Osaka Convention showcased a considerable amount of good music for everyone's enjoyment. For instance, at the Opening Session, acclaimed opera stars, soprano **Shinobu Sato** and tenor **Taro Ichihara** sang with an orchestra, followed by percussion artists from Brazil, Africa and, of course, the host country of Japan. The closing entertainment, on the other hand, featured the Kansai Philharmonic Orchestra, popular TV star, **Kaho Shimada**, gifted tenor **Tsutomu Aragaki**, and **Hideki Togi**, renowned for interpreting Japanese court music and its modern innovations. It just about goes without saying that the final night closed with the traditional singing of "Auld Lang Syne."

Other entertainment on the two stages of the Convention Center and the House of Friendship encompassed a girls' band, the Kansai University Brass Band, live jazz, Japanese folk dance and folk music, Latin songs, and the Osaka Economic University Brass Band. RI Foundation Alumni also performed vocal, piano, cembalo, violin and viola pieces. Perhaps you would agree with me that the entertainment at RI Conventions alone, is worth the price of registration!

Now, on to Chicago and the next opportunity to celebrate 100 years of "Service above Self--through Music"!

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Here Comes the Band... Stand!

The RC of Arroyo Grande, CA, USA is undertaking its RI CENTENNIAL Project to present a permanent bandstand to the city of Arroyo Grande, California, USA. The facility, to be called "The Rotary Bandstand," will be constructed on the Nelson Green in the Old Village area of Arroyo Grande. The traditional-looking, 30-foot-wide by 20-foot-deep stand will utilize special acoustical elements in the ceiling to project better sound as well as feature a wide proscenium, which allows for the best viewing

of musical and performing artists.

While the Arroyo Grande Rotary is spearheading this project, it is also working closely with the Parks Department of the city. The latter will eventually become the owner and caretaker of the facility. Anticipating wide community support for the project, the "Grand Opening" and all dedication events are being initially planned for February 23, 2005, the 100th Anniversary of Rotary, closely followed by the 60th anniversary of the Arroyo Grande Club in May, 2005. Of course, local IFRM'ers will happily be invited to participate in these celebratory events!

Please note that two other Rotary Clubs in neighboring San Luis Obispo are also teaming up to build a "CENTENNIAL" bandstand in one of their city's parks. As with the Arroyo Grande project, it is a special donation to the city to support the fine arts as well as promote local musical activities.

The Evanston Public Library featured Kahn's book, *Keeping the Beat: Healthy Aging Through Amateur Chamber Music Playing*, in a month-long display prior to the event.

Kahn will present a seminar on "Coping with Stress and Performance Anxiety" at the annual convention of the National Flute Association in Nashville, TN, in August.
