

IFRM continues to support the school's music needs, most recently by responding to a request for supplemental funds for a steel band. These fellowship monies, matched by community funds, continue to further our mission in supporting music in the schools as well as our project focus on the preservation of indigenous music.

What is sure to become one of our hallmark projects is the indigenous music literacy program that IFRM supports in **Hana, Hawaii**. The project gets underway this month as the elders and music consultants teach the adults and children the age-old chants of their elders. The Wailuku RC, Maui Community Trust, and IFRM are underwriting the costs for musical instruments, music instruction and notation, and snacks. Stayed tuned for pictures in our February 2009 issue!

And...the mobile van bringing music to 3 to 5 yearolds in two neighborhoods in **Manila**, **Philippines**, should be a reality by year's end. More to come!



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Keeping the Beat

Those who drop by the IFRM booth at R.I. conventions enjoy hearing IFRM member **Paul Bordeleau** playing the piano and leading lively groups of songsters. Wearing his yellow PDG blazer, he plays music ranging from classical to show tunes. His serious and comedic talents have

attracted and charmed thousands of Rotarians. By his own count, he has participated in 13 R.I. Conventions.

"I'm being recycled," Paul says. This year he is President of the RC of Bedford, NH, for the second time. He joined the club in 1973, served as president from 1979-1980 and was District Governor in 1984-85. For the next 15 years he was the official accompanist at the International Assembly as well as at International Conventions, Zone Institutes, and District Conferences. He frequently conducts the choir at District conferences.

He is the coordinator of the Bedford Rotary Club Musical Ensemble, which has played for two Zone Institutes, two District Conferences in Canada, and at the International Conventions in Glasgow and Copenhagen.

Paul has composed two R.I. presidential theme songs: *Be a Friend* (1991) and *Rotary Shares* (2007). Other compositions include *The Luzon March* for the 11th Airborne Division Band and *Christmas in New Hampshire*, dubbed an official song of the state of New Hampshire. He also composed *Sesquicentennial* *Suite* for the symphony orchestra of Manchester, NH in 1996 as well as the *Bedford Odyssey* for the 250th anniversary of the town of Bedford, NH in 2000. His composition, *Lowell, The City of Lights* was first performed at the Santa Claus parade in 1950 and then again 50 years later in 2000.

Paul has performed for U.S. Presidents Ronald Reagan, Gerald Ford and George H.W. Bush, and has accompanied such stars as Dusty Owens and Roy Acuff.

His musical career began in Lowell, Massachusetts where he was born in 1924. He opened his own studio in Bedford, NH in 1973 where he still lives and teaches. For 15 years, Paul was music director of the Massachusetts Public Schools. Paul has been a church organist for 50 years.

Paul's World War II experiences include serving in the signal corps and landing at Omaha Beach. "I was chosen for that duty because I could speak French," he says. Recently his knowledge of French helped him coach a Haitian piano student.

His articles have been published in music magazines in the United States, Germany and Australia. With his wife Wilma, he co-authored the series, *Fun and Play at the Keyboards*=E 2. His latest method book is *Keyboard Player's Guide to Reading Music*.

About four year's ago, Paul launched *Paul Bordeleau's Musical Show* on the local Bedford cable access channel, BCTV. He produces the show monthly and features performers ranging from classical to jazz and pop. Paul is also the Chair of the Sunday afternoon concert series at the Bedford Public Library. He locates talent to perform six programs a year.

In addition to these many activities, Paul directs *Elder Musik*, a program he developed for senior students, particularly those in retirement communities, assisted living, nursing homes or just enjoying retirement. His new publication for *Elder Musik* uses notes in large print to accommodate the vision needs of older players. "Many of my students have been waiting a lifetime for an opportunity to learn to play. Now is their time," he says.


Here's the **highlights** of that meeting:



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On to Birmingham, England...

In 2005, Rotarians met in Chicago, IL to celebrate the centennial of the founding of Rotary. From June 21-24, 2009, Rotarians will congregate from around the world to celebrate 100 years of Rotary International Conventions.

As stated in their convention brochure, "In 1910, 60 inspired Rotarians convened in Chicago. What they started has now become an eagerly anticipated annual tradition attended by tens of thousands of Rotarians from around the globe." Compare 60 Rotarians to the over 30,000 Rotarians who went to Chicago in 2005! And....Birmingham, England is gearing up for a repeat performance.

Your music fellowship is already in full-planning mode. In January, IFRM Chair Susan DuPree and Secretary Lee Denlinger made a whirlwind trip to visit with IFRM Vice-Chair, U.K., Peter Moreton in Northampton to map out plans for IFRM involvement. From there, Susan and Lee trained to Birmingham where they were met by Richard Green. An exhausting day of checking out hotel locations and prices as well as possible venues for an IFRM cocktail party resulted in narrowing down the choice to the Burlington Hotel. This 4-star hotel is strategically located 2 minutes from the train that goes directly to the National Exhibition Center (NEC) convention site. The Birmingham Symphony Hall was booked for the IFRM cocktail party...and, to add to the success of the day, Richard Green agreed to act as IFRM Talent Bank Chair for the convention!

The end of the day found Susan and Lee again on the train to Redcar in Yorkshire where they were greeted by Membership Chair **Peter Sotheran**. The seed of the idea for a short post-convention tour bloomed during the following days, resulting in the outline of the fellowship's first ever post-convention tour available to IFRM members in good standing.

This three-day tour to North Yorkshire includes travel by luxury coach, visiting an Elizabethan stately home en route. A visit to the historic city of York for a day includes a tour of the York Minster and a visit to the Yorvik subterranean Viking Museum. Two banquets, one hosted by IFRM and the other by the RC of Guisborough & Great Ayton, are included. On the journey home is a visit to Bolsover Castle, arriving Saturday evening in time to have a "night on the town" in Birmingham.

IFRM has a limited allocation of "early bird" rates at the Burlington Hotel. As of this writing, there are only 2 single rooms and 8 double rooms still available at IFRM-negotiated rates. Gisborough Hall will be the home hotel in North Yorkshire. The former home of Lord Gisborough, the Hall stands in acres of parkland close to the North Yorkshire Moors. Currently there are 4 single rooms and 11 doubles available at IFRM rates.
