Keeping the Beat...

A Close-up Look at Jean Martyn

Those of us fortunate enough to hear Jean Martyn play in Birmingham at the RI Convention last June were amazed at her virtuosity on the keyboard. "The Queen of the Keyboards" as her fans and friends know her, plays piano, electronic organ, classical pipe organ and keyboards. She approaches the stage with an immense stock of music in her head, ready to play, depending on her mood and requests from the audience. Her *joie de vivre* shines through everything she plays!

Jean, a Rotarian in District 1210 (England) for eleven years, is equally adept at playing classics, jazz, swing, or her own arrangements of music from the 1940s. She is a globe-trotting musician, and has played in America (where she met Senator J. D. Rockefeller) as well as in Germany, Holland, Italy and Switzerland. She is often called upon for recordings and live broadcasts for the BBC. She gladly performs to raise money for cancer research, programs for the blind and Rotary charities.

Her recordings on CD include performances on piano, electronic organ and on her passion – the theater organ. She is the only female organist to have recorded on the Tower Ballroom Wurlitzer, Blackpool, England in the last 50 years. This year she is performing at many organ festivals throughout England. Her three-day 30th Anniversary Celebration in June, 2010, will include Jean playing a feast of all types of music to a specially invited audience on both electronic organ and a special concert on theater organ.

"My proudest achievement was being presented to Her Royal Highness, The Princess Royal at St. James's Palace in London in December, 2009, just before giving a piano concert there." A benefit for the Not Forgotten Heroes Association, the program featured Jean accompanying the Swinging Sweethearts '40s group. The guest of honor was Dame Vera Lynn, now 93 years old, who was known during the Second World War as the forces' sweetheart. Jean felt privileged to accompany her. The audience included 300 veterans of world wars, including young soldiers returning from Afghanistan and Iraq.

Jean loves to sign autographs for her fans, and chat with them after performances.

Jean has been playing professionally for 30 years. She started playing tunes of nursery rhymes on the family piano when she was three years old. She received a degree from Trinity College of Music in London for the piano and a degree from the Guildhall School of Music in London for the organ. She was appointed organist of her local church in 1962 in Brownhills at the age of 11, and still occasionally slides onto the organ bench to give the regular organist a break.



My most embarrassing moment: "As I was playing in concert, on a hot stage, an electric fan came on and blew three pages off my music stand so I had to skip three pages. Did anyone notice? I'll never know," says Jean.

Jean comes from a musical family. Her grandparents were musicians; her mother, now age 91, was a violinist, and her father, now age 92, was a chorister. Jean has one son who plays cello and keyboards.

My best advice to young musicians: "Keep persevering. Practice may seem difficult at times but it is well worth the effort."

Meet the New World Choir Director by Ada Kahn, Ph.D.



Judith Walker, Rotary Club of Hammond, Indiana, USA, has been chosen as the new Director of the IFRM World Choir. Following an extensive search process, IFRM Chair Susan DuPree announced the appointment. Walker's selection follows the retirement of Chungsam

Doh, who conducted the World Choir for the past eight years.

"I am honored and thrilled to direct the World Choir," said Walker. "I look forward to our first performance at the RI Convention in Montreal in June." Judith is currently seeking out new compositions for the performance and will be in contact with participants this spring.

Judy, as she is known to friends, is a busy Rotarian as well as musician. She is in her second term as president of the Rotary club of Hammond, Indiana. Her Rotary career began eight years ago in 2002 during which time she served as vicepresident in charge of programs for her club before becoming president-elect and then president.

Currently, Judy is Director of Music at the First United Methodist Church in Griffith, Indiana. The music program there includes a 34-voice adult choir which she conducts at two services weekly. She also coordinates the scheduling of all the music in the church. A lyric soprano, Judy has sung with the Northwest Indiana Symphony chorus and says she loves singing just as much as being a choral director.

Judy's boundless vitality is sure to bring excitement and energy to the World Choir. "I feel like I never accomplish enough in a day. I enjoy being with people," she says. In addition to her considerable music-filled days, she manages to squeeze in participation on the condominium association board where she lives in Munster, Indiana.

Judy grew up on the south side of Chicago. Her family home was consumed by the construction of an expressway years ago and the family moved to Indiana. She attended the University of Illinois at Champaign for her Bachelor and Master of Music degrees with an emphasis in choral music. Her major instrument was voice; her minor instrument was the pipe organ.

The new World Choir Director is a retired college professor (Professor Emerita) and taught music at the Hammond, Indiana campus of Purdue University.

After 19 years on the Board of Directors of the Northwest Indiana Symphony Society, she was hired as the symphony's Executive Director and served in that capacity for six years. "I loved working with talent agents and hiring the guest



artists for performances as well as getting to know the musicians," says Judy.

Judy's focus is often on her family. She dotes on her nine grandchildren. There

are four living in her area and five elsewhere. "We communicate with the distant ones by Skype. It's a marvelous use of technology," she says.

Judy is a true "sandwich" generation person: she also spends considerable time with her mother, an active 90-year-old who still drives a car.

Hobbies? "I started golf. I'm terrible at it, but I love it."

For relaxation Judy is studying harp and enjoys taking lessons. "I really had no previous ambition for the harp until I started working with the symphony. I was fascinated watching the harpist play in the orchestra. During the holidays in such places as the former Marshall Field store in Chicago and the Tea Room in the American Girl store, I would gravitate to the harpist. In the fall of 2003, I decided to ask the principal harpist of our orchestra where I could rent a harp. As soon as I started lessons, I was hooked. There wasn't any learning curve for me regarding reading music for the harp, because it's the same as piano music. Now I own two harps. My teacher is 85 years old and still really vibrant. This whole scenario is good. "Playing a new instrument builds brain cells," says Judy.

Judith Walker's dynamism is sure to transfer to the World Choir with her first performance as Director in Montreal.

professionalism and dedication. "He will be difficult to replace," wrote Huggins. "Singing in the World Choir is an experience that's hard to beat."

Message to the World is hitting the charts in England. Composed by Rotarian and IFRM member **Barry Phillips** (RC of Grantham, England) and recorded by **Ono Band** members Barry Phillips, Geoff Braunton and Irvin Metcalf, the song has raised over £26,000 for the *Polio Plus* campaign. The Ono Band was formed in 2004 to raise funds for Rotary causes. The Band features popular tunes of the 60's and 70's.

David Pope (RC of Abingdon, England), inspired by the website *Sing for Water*, proposes a similar idea to link clubs along a route to form a choir to raise funds for *Polio Plus*. His initial plan is to gather clubs along the Thames River to sing, but his idea could be adapted to any river or highway anywhere.

"Queen of the Keyboards" **Jean Martyn** (RC of Brewood, England) continues to entertain audiences and accompany choral groups around the world. She is in high demand and gives her time and talent to a variety of non-profit fundraising groups.

Trevor Picken (RC of Gloucester, England) presented the world premier of *The Gloucester Rotary Song* at the RI Convention in Birmingham in June 2009. Rotarian **John Sargent** (RC of Gloucester) arranged the music that was played by brass bands in the HOF.

Sweeping Changes Mark Susan's Tenure as IFRM Chair: 2005-2010

Bringing us into the 21st Century was Susan **DuPree's** theme when she stepped into the position of IFRM Chair in June 2005.

In these past five years, the music fellowship has undergone a transformation under Susan's leadership: computer technology replaced paper records, communication fostered membership growth through the Yahoo Mail List, IFRM took a leadership role in providing entertainment in the HOFs at RI Conventions, a 501(c)3 was formed to fund music literacy projects throughout the Rotary world, and the booth became a meeting place for IFRM members at conventions.

Jack Welch, former chair and CEO of General Electric Co., said, "Good leaders create a vision, articulate the vision, passionately own the vision and relentessly drive it to completion." He could have been referring to IFRM Chair Susan.

Susan communicates her vision and causes others to buy into it. Former IFRM Treasurer and current Director Curtis Reinhardt (RC of Arroyo Grande, CA) promoted the involvement of IFRM as the only fellowship to be a member of the RI Donor Advised Fund. His successor, Treasurer Rod Fivelstad (RC of Grass Valley, CA), developed annual budget monitoring through the use of *Quick* Books.

Current Membership Chair Peter Sotheran (RC of Guisborough and Great Ayton, England) recommended a new dues structure, developed an on-line Yahoo Mail List, and streamlined the

members' on-line Directory with the help of Webmaster François Daoust. Through the talented directorship of Chungsam Doh (RC of Morro Bay, CA), the Rotary World Choir became a mainstay at the RI Converntion's Interfaith Services.

A leader inspires dedication by example, doing whatever it takes to complete the next step toward the vision. Whether it is being magnanimous in recognizing and rewarding the service of others or integrating her outward actions with her inner core values, Susan examplifies integrity, openness and transparency. These qualities have engendered trust among her IFRM family.

Being dedicated means spending whatever time or energy is necessary in order to accomplish the task at hand. In her search for a World Choir Director to succeed Chungsam, Susan spent long hours developing an equitable selection process. She viewed tapes, personally interviewed each applicant, and then traveled to see the finalists in action before recommending her choice to the Board.

But, you might ask, what drives Susan? Lee Denlinger thinks that it is her creativity, the "What if...?" possibilities of thinking outside the box. "She is relentless in making things happen," says Lee.

Biographical Sketch

Susan likes to say that her musical career started when she played the drums while leading the school Maypole Parade at age 6. She went on from there to sing in school choirs (elementary school through college), be a soloist/winner in various talent competitions, and a Rotary song leader.

While in the U.S. Peace Corps in the Philippines, Susan was an event soloist and harmonized in a folk music trio in the style of Peter, Paul and Marv. She also taught English to adults in Afghanistan through the auspices of US AID and the United Nations Education Initiative.

Upon her return, she studied dulcimer and dance with the San Francisco Folk Music Society as well as movement/dance therapy with Tamara Greenberg and Stanley Kelemann. She worked as a movement therapist at the San Francisco Lighhouse for the Blind.

Susan has a Bachelor of Science degree in Music, a Master of Arts degree in Special Education and a Ph.D. in Clinical Psychology. She works fulltime in her own private practice.

- **Signatures:** This is a 'closed list' that can be read only by subscribers who are current members of IFRM so it is generally quite safe to use your normal name rather than a jokey 'handle'.
- **Quotes and Re-quotes:** Some members still have slow broadband or dial-up connections with a perminute charge. Lengthy quotes from earlier messages cost time and money to download. If your e-mail program automatically pastes previous messages to your reply, it is preferable to disable that feature or delete the quotation.
- **Subject Lines:** When the topic drifts way from the original subject (they usually do!), remember to change the subject line. Similarly, if you receive the 'digest' mode, remember to change the subject in order to indicate what you are replying to.
